This Story Began on a Cold Thanksgiving Night, and We Haven't Stopped Being Grateful!

Readers of this monthly "Volunteer Spotlight" column know that there are many varied paths to becoming a Forgotten Cats volunteer. The path to Forgotten Cats for the March 2023 spotlighted volunteer began more than 11 years ago on a cold Thanksgiving night. Patty Penland was cleaning up after Thanksgiving dinner, taking out the trash when she heard a whimpering sound in the backyard. She searched and found a mother cat and 4 kittens shivering in the cold, so of course Patty brought them into her home and made a bed for them in her spare room. A friend told her about Forgotten Cats, and how she could get these kitties spayed/neutered at a reasonable cost. Patty called FC and made an appointment, taking the momma and her babies in for their 'spa day'.

At the Trainer clinic she met several people who explained they were all volunteers; and she met FC founder, Felicia Cross, who gave her a tour of the facility and told her about the work FC volunteers do. Patty was fascinated with

all she heard, including the number of cats FC routinely handles in a day's surgery. Thus, when Felicia asked Patty if she would like to be a Forgotten Cats volunteer, the decision was an easy one – how soon could she start!?



Patty's volunteer story began at the Trainer Clinic as a feed and clean volunteer. She enjoyed that job because she could work at her own pace and hang out with all the cats, getting to know each one's personality. Little did she know that this would be just the first of many different volunteer jobs Patty would do for Forgotten Cats! Soon she was also cleaning traps in the trap room and feeding and caring for cats awaiting surgery. Next was handling cats in recovery -- after cats have surgery, they come to the recovery table where they are comforted, cared for and are watched until they start to wake up. Then they go back to their carriers or traps.

"It was very easy to transition into the role of a Forgotten Cats volunteer because the people who trained me and introduced me to other volunteers were so nice. They showed me how to do everything, and many of the people with whom I have volunteered have become my friends. It's been a wonderful experience." Patty tells us.

Patty then learned how to trap feral cats and bring them into the clinic for treatment. She said, "I've done a lot of trapping over the years!" Her first big 'trapping adventure' was with Felicia down in Middletown, Delaware. "On our first day we trapped 44 cats! Felicia taught me how to bait and work the traps and the next day I went back alone and trapped 20 more cats! The following day, 10 more for a grand total of 74 cats! That was a good weekend, all cats were spayed/neutered, and many were put up for adoption, with the rest being returned to their original location with tipped ears." Patty currently feeds four colonies in the New Castle area, about 40 cats daily.

Patty recalls that some colonies are eventually moved to a barn because their old location is deemed unsafe. "I was taught how to take our not-so-adoptable cats – the ones who prefer to live outside rather than in a comfy home with a new family – for set up in barns. Some of the barn homes are gorgeous and amazing! These barn cats enjoy barn homes as places to roam without being in

danger. This knowledge came in handy when one of my own colonies were in a location that had become dangerous. The building at that location was being demolished to make way for new construction and 6 cats had to be relocated. If not for what I learned about barn homes from Forgotten Cats, I would have been lost, but thanks to Forgotten Cats I was able to find a great barn home where my colony cats are still living today and I receive regular updates on them. All I can say is they are living like royalty!"

Over the years, Patty has also been involved in the transport of cats – both to other rescue centers that were in need of adoptable cats, and to area medical facilities when specialized care was needed. She did two transports of cats from FC to an animal shelter in Maine, each time transporting 20 cats to this great rescue operation. Most recently, she transported 20 cats to another shelter which finds purrfect homes for our kitties, this time in upstate New York.

Patty's local transports have included runs between the Trainer and Willow Grove clinics in addition to area vets for dental or other special appointments.

Patty tells us that over the years, some of her FC adventures have been quite unusual.

When asked for an example of an 'unusual adventure', Patty told us about the time she handled a kitten rescue from a storm drain! Someone called her when they heard kitten cries from a storm drain. "Although that was pretty scary" Patty tells us, "I checked it out and could see the frightened kitten. Luckily with some help we were able to lift the heavy metal piece that covers the storm drain. I normally keep a trap in my van so I was able to climb down and set the trap. Saying there wasn't much room down there is an understatement! This drain ran across and under two corners of the road before being closed off, so the kitten ran back and forth before actually going in the trap. I couldn't fit thru most of the tunnel so I


just sat patiently and hoped he went in the trap. Luckily, there wasn't much water down there. After about 30 minutes his hunger got the best of him and into the trap he went! He was tiny – only about four weeks old. My niece had helped me with this rescue and we were so excited to finally get him." The photos at right are ones taken by Patty's niece, showing us some visual images of this truly 'unusual adventure'!

We still haven't come to the end of the list of the many things Patty does for Forgotten Cats!

Patty was a foster mom twice – but she tells us she failed both times! She said she has eight cats so she couldn't afford to fail again and she gave up on that role! "My 8 cats are Toby, Sammy, Bella, Joey, Heidi, Miss Wiggles, Jay Jay and Tabitha" says Patty. "I have to say I love these cats and they have so much personality and bring so much joy to my life. I never owned a cat until 11 years ago, and I guess technically, I still don't. I think they own me."











Patty has also worked at the Brandywine PetSmart adoption events a few times.

Patty tells us that her biggest FC passion is what she is doing now – prep for surgery on Wednesdays at the Trainer clinic. "I've been doing prep for 16 months now. On a typical surgery day, the cats for spay/neuter go through a well-orchestrated procedure where one volunteer gives the cats a shot to sedate them, not always an easy job when trying to sedate a feral cat. Then the cat comes to another volunteer – my station – where s/he is weighed, eyes lubed, checked over for any possible wounds, then given pain meds, cleaned thoroughly and shaved. Next I take the cat to the vet for the surgery. After surgery, the cat goes to the vet tech for testing and shots and then sent to

recovery. We normally do around 50+ cats on a Wednesday."

What a fascinating journey Patty has been on over the past 11 years doing so many varied volunteer jobs for Forgotten Cats, doing them all so well! Amazing! And she does have a life outside of FC! Mother, grandmother and retail shop owner! For 15 years she operated a vintage toy shop in southern Delaware, buying and selling toys. She traveled to Washington, DC weekly checking out toys at auctions and resale shops. Her biggest passion was dolls – buying, cleaning and restoring them for resale. She says she did quite well for years until the competition became stronger and the internet took over.

Well, vintage toys' loss became Forgotten Cats' gain! Thank goodness for your Thanksgiving night discovery 11 years ago that ultimately brought you to us! Yours is a marvelous story to tell! And thank you for being such a special part of what we do for the kitties!

FEED AND CLEAN VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

We are in need of volunteers to help with feed and clean in the morning every day of the week for trapped cats waiting for or recovering from surgery.

Responsibilities include feeding cats in their traps and providing clean paper in the trap. Training will be provided.

PS: We also need people to wash cages, carriers, etc. Unfortunately, not having volunteers to wash cages is becoming an on-going issue. Cages, carriers, etc. can come any time - night or day. This is an important job to keep the cats and kittens we serve healthy and would require some upper body strength.



We have an immediate need for CLINIC Volunteers in our Delaware County, PA facility, near Claymont, DE.

This is an opportunity to help cats whose only medical treatment during their lifetime may be when they go to our clinic. <u>Volunteering at the clinics is an important and serious undertaking and we are looking for the few ready to make the commitment.</u> CLINIC volunteers need to commit to one specific day a week at the clinic. The reason for this is that we are dealing with the lives of the cats, and we need to make sure that our volunteers know the clinic procedures, and this can only be done by volunteering on at least a once-a-week basis. We will train. No medical background required.

We are looking for help on <u>Tuesdays</u>, <u>Wednesdays & Thursdays</u>. Volunteers must commit to either one full day a week or half a day.
