### Delco TNVR Program - A Win for Delco Cats!

Several weeks ago, Forgotten Cats trapper Sharon Sponheimer was driving through Chester, PA at night when she spotted a stray cat near a car wash. Curious, she asked the man sitting nearby if he knew where the cat came from and learned that it was one of several strays in an alley. The next day she and a fellow trapper went back and caught 32 cats. After being sterilized, vetted, and evaluated for friendliness, 11 of them returned to the community and 21 were ready for loving homes.

This is a handful of the 1,200+ cats throughout Delaware County that have been helped because of the Delco funding that serves low-income communities. In the Fall of 2021, three generous donors came together to offer a matching campaign to help the cats of Delaware County. Together, along with

FC's dedicated supporters, \$60,000 was raised to support this mission. Not only has the funding been instrumental in FC's own TNVR efforts but it also allowed smaller non-profits like Animal Friends of Lansdowne and Helping Paws of Upper Darby to increase their TNVR efforts in the county. One of the largest obstacles in TNVR is finding the funding to support the spay/neuter. This program eliminates that obstacle and allows these groups to focus all their energy into TNVR.

Even during the pandemic trappers like Sharon never stopped working, so everyone did their part to ensure our doors stayed open through all the restrictions. As one of the only spay/neuter clinics available at the time, those short-term clients became dedicated

collaborators who continue to benefit from the program that FC supporters contribute to.

Before having access to the Delco funding, Sharon says she only had the bandwidth to trap in Chester. Although she still focuses on that area, she has now expanded her footprint to far reaching areas like Springfield, Bryn Mawr, and Glen Mills.

Some of her biggest projects included clearing a hoarding house of 30+ strays, rescuing a kitten from a carrier that children were tossing around like a ball, and trapping a mama cat that was shot with a bb gun. These cats would have kept reproducing and been exposed to further neglect in ways that couldn't be remedied without proper intervention.

Despite all this, one of the leading factors in the Delco overpopulation crisis is that 75% of townships do not have animal control or spay/neuter clinics within a reasonable distance. More strays on the streets means more cats are likely to get accidentally run over or cause property damage due to marking behaviors. This ultimately creates tension between everyone and leads to mistrust towards those trying to help.

"Most people that live in these areas care about the cats and want to feed them, but there are just too many to manage. When we come in to help them get their colony under control, the neighbors are more neighborly because they don't feel overwhelmed. People don't realize that a colony of four can quadruple in a year. You have to get in there as early as possible," she says.

So far this year Sharon and her small team have

trapped 735 cats and continue to average between 20 and 40 cats per week. She says she has been continually impressed by the commitment everyone at FC has shown to ensuring the mission continues, even when the clinic is at full capacity.

"This program has been critical in helping us increase our numbers because we had the availability to fund it. When you need to fundraise on your own, that takes time out of your trapping capacity. When all you need to think about is how to spend the money correctly and the number of cats that need your help, you can stay focused on what's in front of you."

As trappers' presence increases throughout the county, more communities become aware of

Forgotten Cats and the variety of services we provide. To meet that need we built a second floor for our Trainer, PA location. The expansion includes additional holding space for cats coming in for spay/neuter, which will allow us to add more clinic days to help the 40,000+ homeless cats in Delco.



In the meantime, it's important for TNR advocates to educate others and help dispel any misconceptions that make people wary. A few of those myths include the idea that ear tipping causes permanent pain to the cat or that sterilized cats will lose their prey drive as good hunters. Also, many people are unaware that females as young as six months old can have litters, or that cats with genetic lineage will mate with each other.

Another great way that community members can contribute is to be a guiding voice in their local government to ensure there are trapper friendly laws. Some towns like Brookhaven have been harder to work in due to strict regulations that close off neighborhoods needing urgent assistance.

These actions would be a massive help in making the next kitten season a little easier for all our dedicated trappers. One day Sharon hopes that each township has four to five trappers so that as soon as someone sees a homeless cat they can be picked up and be promptly cared for.

"People think that making the phone call is enough and get confused when they're put on a waiting list. To truly make a difference in reducing the population in the long haul, the community has to educate each other, learn how to TNR, foster, adopt, and care for colony cats," says Sharon.

We want to make sure that all communities continue to receive assistance through the Delco TNVR program. We would prefer to put them in foster homes and then, once old enough, into our adoption centers. The kittens we would like fostered range in age from a few days old to a few weeks. We also have

They can be kept in a large dog crate which we will provide. All you need to do is provide food and water for the mom and clean her litter box once/day. They can stay in a basement, bathroom, or any spare room in your home. The crate is about 2' X 3' and can sit on the floor or table. The kittens will be ready for adoption in a few weeks' time and at that point we will take mom and kittens back.

They are the cutest little balls of fur. You will get so much enjoyment from watching them develop and knowing that they will be going to homes where they will be cared for the rest of their lives.

### Meet the Keys to Getting the Brookhaven Adoption Center Up and Running Post Covid!

The Forgotten Cats manager at the Brookhaven PetSmart adoption center, Holly Goldfeder, speaks fondly of this month's spotlighted volunteers (yes, they're a team!), mother-daughter combo, Jill and Natalie Carter. Holly says they have been volunteering at least once a week for the past five years, picking up extra shifts as needed. "Jill and Natalie helped us to reopen after the Covid shutdown. They were

some of the few volunteers that would come in for shifts at that time, so they were there most days, enabling us to function again. I remember thinking we wouldn't have been up and running without them."

Jill says that they have been volunteering since Natalie was in 8<sup>th</sup> grade (she is now getting ready to begin her freshman year at West Chester University). She adds, "Natalie needed to do some volunteering hours for her school. Because she was a minor, I needed to be involved so it made sense to choose something we would both enjoy doing. We both loved animals; as a child I always brought home strays to care for and find homes if necessary. Animals always had a special place in my heart. So one day, because it was close to our home, we decided to stop in the Brookhaven PetSmart and see if there were volunteer opportunities there. We talked to the volunteer on duty, Fred, who gave us a lot of helpful information. We then decided to become FC volunteers at the Brookhaven adoption center; we completed the training and have been volunteering at least once a week since then. "

"We enjoy volunteering so much for FC!" continues Jill. She says they truly enjoy helping to care for the cats and getting to know potential adopters. They clean condos, give food and water, socialize and play with the cats and kittens, clean the cat center, talk to people about volunteering and about the adoption process.

About working with prospective adoptive parents, Jill says "We enjoy caring for the cats, helping them find good homes – seeing them get adopted. I enjoy greeting people and talking with them in the hall to invite them to come in! And once they've adopted, it's so nice to see pictures of new families with their newly adopted kitties!"

Besides their work at Brookhaven, they have also stepped forward to serve as fosters when needed, to care for cats and kittens in their home, and to socialize them for adoption. Holly says that they have cared for cats and kittens with serious medical conditions that need a lot of care. She notes, "Jill and Natalie are both very sweet and dedicated – not only do they work at the adoption center, they always help at the adoption events – such a cute mom and daughter team!"




We are so happy and feel so blessed to have them in our home. It's been a little over 24 hours and to look at them, one would think




they've been here for months.



# \_FIV+ Cat Facts

Cats who test positive for Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV) are often euthanized or are considered unadoptable. In fact, cats who test positive for FIV usually live long, healthy lives and do not infect other household pets.

Transmission: "FIV is mainly passed from cat to cat through deep bite wounds, the kind that usually occur outdoors during aggressive fights and territorial disputes—the perfect reason to keep your cat inside." - The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA)\*

"Casual non-aggressive behavior" does not spread FIV. "Cats in households with stable social structures [...] are at little risk for acquiring infections." -Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine\*

MYTH: A cat can pass on FIV by living with other household cats, sharing water bowls and cleaning each other.

FACT: FIV is only transmitted through deep blood-drawing bite wounds. FIV+ cats can happy lives in socialized multicat households.

MYTH: FIV+ cats will become ill and die at an early age.

FACT: FIV+ cats do not have a higher incidence of illness, and live the same lifespan as non FIV+ cats.

Lifespan: Multiple medical studies show that cats who test positive for FIV live just as long as FIVnegative cats.\*

"FIV itself does not cause severe clinical signs, and FIV infected cats live many years without any health problems."
